Hello. My name is Barbara Ross and I am a native Oregonian who has lived in this beautiful state my entire life. I am very proud of many firsts for Oregon and one of them is our tradition of mail-in balloting. Having lived in rural Eastern Oregon as well as in the Willamette Valley, I appreciate the integrity and the convenience of mail-in balloting. Whether as a stay-at-home mom with preschoolers, a busy career person who worked out-of-town, or most recently an active retired person who enjoys traveling, I've always known I can vote at a time that works for me. I also appreciate that mail-in balloting gives me the opportunity to vote responsibly. No matter how complicated life is, I can find time to spread all of the information out on my kitchen table, pour myself a cup of tea, read through the voter's guides and the materials that were left at my door or delivered to my mailbox, and make thoughtful decisions without feeling rushed.

I also believe that mail-in ballot is safe. Oregon has one of the highest rates of voter participation in the nation because we make it convenient for people to vote.
