Testimony in Opposition to Oregon Senate Bill 210	

Dear Members of the Oregon State Legislature,

I am writing to express my strong opposition to Senate Bill 210 (SB 210), which seeks to dismantle Oregon's successful vote-by-mail system and introduce unnecessary barriers to voting. Oregon's mail-in voting system has been a model for the nation, providing accessible, secure, and convenient voting options for all citizens, regardless of their location or ability to vote in person.

This bill would require in-person voting on Election Day as the primary method, undoing decades of progress and threatening the inclusivity of our electoral process. These measures could be a significant burden for many voters who do not have access to government-issued IDs, further alienating already marginalized communities. It is essential that our state continues to prioritize easy access to voting for all residents, not restrict it with additional red tape.

The successful implementation of Oregon's vote-by-mail system has led to higher voter turnout and has become a cornerstone of our democratic process. SB 210 undermines the accessibility and integrity of our elections. I urge you to reject this bill and continue to protect Oregon's model of democracy that ensures every eligible voter has the right and opportunity to participate.
