Measure, Appointment or Topic: SB210

Members of the committee, I express my strong opposition to Senate Bill 210. The proposed shift to in-person voting as the primary election method poses a serious threat to voter accessibility in Oregon. Our current vote-by-mail system has demonstrated exceptional effectiveness in maximizing voter participation, a testament to its convenience and security. Reverting to a predominantly in-person model would inevitably create obstacles for:

- * Elderly and disabled citizens: Physical limitations could hinder their ability to reach polling stations.

- * Individuals in remote areas: Long travel distances would create a significant burden.

- * Working-class families: The inability to take time off work would restrict their voting access.

- * Those lacking reliable transport: Accessing polling places would become a major challenge.

Moreover, the integrity of our vote-by-mail system is well-established. Claims of widespread fraud are baseless. SB 210 would impose unnecessary financial and logistical burdens on election officials, while simultaneously diminishing voter engagement.

Oregon has long been a model for inclusive elections. This legislation would reverse this progress, effectively disenfranchising numerous Oregonians. I implore you to reject Senate Bill 210.
