Empirical evidence demonstrates that voter fraud within Oregon's vote-by-mail system is exceedingly rare. For instance, in the 2020 election, out of millions of ballots cast, only 140 instances of potential voter fraud were identified, with just four cases referred for further investigation. This low incidence rate underscores the system's reliability and the effectiveness of its security measures.

Repealing Oregon's vote-by-mail system would represent a significant step backward for our state's democracy. It would disenfranchise voters who rely on the convenience and accessibility of mail-in voting, increase election costs, and dismantle a system that has demonstrated both security and efficacy over decades.
