Increased wait times, higher administrative costs, and logistical complications are probable outcomes. These factors could deter voter participation, particularly among communities already facing access challenges.

Maintaining Election Integrity and Voter Confidence:

While in-person voting is a critical element of democracy, mandating it as the sole method on election day may lead to unnecessary risks. A single-day, in-person system could be prone to technical issues, long queues, and other administrative errors that would not only frustrate voters but also undermine confidence in the election process. Oregon's mail-in system, by contrast, has a proven record of reliability and security that supports the integrity of our elections.

Conclusion:

For the reasons outlined above, I urge you to oppose SB 210. Maintaining our current mail-in system is essential to ensuring that every Oregonian has the opportunity to vote safely, conveniently, and securely.
