Dear Members of the Oregon State Legislature,

I am writing to express my unequivocal opposition to Senate Bill 210, which seeks to dismantle Oregon's long-standing vote-by-mail system in favor of mandatory in-person voting on Election Day.

It is imperative to recognize that SB 210 does not serve the interests of Oregonians. Instead, it is a flagrant attempt at voter suppression, a shameless and brazen attack on the democratic values and freedoms upon which our country was conceived.

Moving away from this proven method not only disregards empirical evidence but also sows unwarranted doubt in the electoral process—and in American democracy itself.

I urge you to reject Senate Bill 210 and uphold the integrity of Oregon's electoral system for the sake of our American Experiment, the revolutionary and world-changing assertion that a nation could be founded on principles of democracy, liberty, and self-governance—an unprecedented vision at the time of the country's founding.
