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Mail-in voting should be abolished because it introduces several significant risks and challenges that compromise the integrity of our elections. In contrast, in-person voting provides immediate assistance, allowing voters to correct mistakes on the spot.

Additionally, mail-in voting creates delays in the election process. Unlike in-person voting, which provides immediate results, mail-in ballots take longer to count and verify, leading to uncertainty and waiting for election outcomes. This delay not only frustrates voters but also leaves the results open to speculation and manipulation in the interim.

The system also relies heavily on the postal service, which is not always reliable. Delays in mail delivery could result in ballots arriving after the deadline, causing legitimate votes to be excluded. In areas where the postal service is inefficient or unreliable, this becomes an even bigger problem, disenfranchising voters who depend on timely delivery.

Moreover, not all voters have equal access to mail-in voting. People living in rural or isolated areas, or those without reliable internet or transportation, may face obstacles in obtaining or returning their mail-in ballots. This creates an unfair system that disproportionately affects certain groups, undermining the principle of equal access to voting.

Finally, mail-in voting erodes voter privacy. When people fill out their ballots at home, they may be subject to outside influence or even coercion. In-person voting, on the other hand, ensures a private and secure environment for casting a vote, free from outside pressure.

For all these reasons, mail-in voting introduces unnecessary risks and complications, and it's time we moved away from it in favor of a system that guarantees fairness, security, and efficiency
