

I've been working on election integrity since 2022 in Deschutes County, Oregon. I've learned a lot. There are multiple problems with mail in voting. Without any proof, we hear from the media that US elections are safe. States count and recount illegal votes and get the same number each time rather than look into the fraud. If I count a stack of counterfeit bills over and over I will come up with the same number each time.

As an American and an Oregonian, we have the choice to vote in US elections (unless our rights have been removed based on our own behavior). Non-US citizens do not have this right and they do not have an allegiance to the USA. According to the Elections FAQ page on Oregon SOS site, this is how the SOS "ensures" only US Citizens are voting, by asking and trusting people to "verify and attest" when they say they are US Citizens; not requiring proof of US Citizenship and assuming the voter is deterred by the fact that providing false information is a felony. They have already proven they do not have an allegiance to the USA. Verification of citizenship is a MUST for voting, it should not be made such a mockery. Without borders we do not have a country.

**" How does Oregon ensure only U.S. citizens are voting?"**

Only U.S. citizens may vote in Oregon elections. People must verify and attest they are U.S. citizens when registering to vote, and only voters who have registered in Oregon will have their ballot counted. Providing false information when registering to vote is a felony."

For 128 years, from 1859 – 1987, **63% of Oregon elected Oregon Governors' were Republicans.** In 1987, vote by mail became permanent in Oregon. Yet, since 1987, **100% of Governors elected have been Democrats.** Coincidence? See page 4 for data supporting these facts.

Vote by mail is riddled with problems, the biggest problem is ballot chain of custody. With vote by mail our ballots go into black holes where chain of custody cannot be proven including: who printed the ballot, confirmation that the ballot delivered, was the recipient a US citizen and a registered voter, is the citizen still a resident, is the citizen still alive, who filled out the ballot, was the ballot returned for counting.

2). Ballots sent by US mail may not be delivered to the voter and may not be returned to the election office, here's a couple of Oregon examples.

3). The vote by mail process requires scanning of ballots and separation of ballots from their signed envelope. Once a ballot has been scanned the data can be digitally manipulated, not easily done with paper ballots which are hand counted. Why risk it?

4). After ballot scanning, the data is populated into a database, again, the data can be digitally manipulated. Voting on paper makes it much more difficult for the data to be manipulated.

3). In 2016, the Motor Voter act came into play (<https://sos.oregon.gov/voting/Pages/motor-voter-faq.aspx>). This act is riddled with problems. Why has Oregon adopted compulsory/mandatory voting registration?

a. Without their consent, children age of 16 are added to the voter data base when interacting with the DMV, and have to request to be unregistered. **Why?** – the are not of legal age to vote.

**What if I don't want to register to vote?**

Opting out is simple. The Elections Division will send you information on Oregon Motor Voter that explains your automatic voter registration options. If you don't want to be registered, just check the box on the OMV Card to opt out (decline registration), sign it, and drop it in the mail. A pre-paid postage envelope is included with your OMV letter.

b. Also without consent of anyone who does business with the DMV they are automatically registered to vote.

4). In 2020, Deschutes County reported 140 instances of potential voter fraud. Without data, the media parrots their narrative, “there have been no reports of widespread illegal voting”. Keyword, “widespread” – what is their definition of “widespread”? How do they know it is not widespread?

## Deschutes County Illegal Votes

As of the latest updates, **there have been no reports of widespread illegal voting in Deschutes County**. However, in 2020, residents and local election officials reported 140 instances of potential voter fraud, out of millions of votes cast. <sup>3</sup> Of these cases, four were referred to the Oregon Department of Justice, and two of those are still pending resolution. <sup>3</sup> Deschutes County takes election security very seriously and has measures in place to ensure the integrity of the voting process, including verifying citizenship and cross-checking voter records for individuals who have moved, have duplicate records, or have passed away. <sup>3</sup>

In the wake of recent ballot box attacks, Deschutes County Clerk Steve Dennison has reassured voters about the security of their ballots. <sup>5</sup> He emphasized that ballot boxes are county property and that law enforcement is aware of their locations and monitors them regularly. <sup>5</sup>

In conclusion, the only SAFE way to vote is:

Eligible US Citizens choose if they want to register to vote and do so with proof of US citizenship identification

US Citizens go to a polling place to vote on voting day (one day only) showing their US identification and are verified against a voter registration role.

Votes are completed on an official ballot printed for this specific election.

Votes are tallied by hand and results are tabulated.
