Good morning. My name is Ron Brocklehurst. I have had the honor, and privilege, to be an ASPIRE mentor for the past 9  $\frac{1}{2}$  years, first at Newport High School, then at Toledo High School. I have mentored approximately 500 high school students during my 9  $\frac{1}{2}$  years. I normally mentor groups of 3-7 kids at a time for about 12 hours per week.

As a mentor I see the profound impact that ASPIRE has on these kids. Many of these small-school students have no idea of what their options are once they graduate from high school. Hearing from their ASPIRE mentors that they can join the military, go to a trade school, community college, or to a university opens their eyes. Plainly put, ASPIRE is changing these kids' lives.

I'd also like to add that the dedication of the ASPIRE coordinators that I have worked with (Melinda Dye and Jen Hamilton) both humble and inspire me to do more for these kids. These two amazing human beings are, in my opinion, under-appreciated and under-paid. They both have my respect and admiration.
