Mail-in voting as a standard is one of the aspects that sets Oregon apart from other states and encourages increased voter turnout. Reverting to an antiquated means of in-person voting on the day of an election is unnecessary, will increase costs, decrease voter turnout, and further instill the feeling that the legislature is intentionally designing the process to make citizens less involved in the voting process.
