I love my job treating PTSD in our nation's veterans. My husband is a combat veteran himself and is now a student at OSU studying to be a physical therapist. We pursue our goals with passion to improve our lives and those of others. To put all of our effort toward building our family each month and not achieve our goal is devastating and financially draining. We have struggled for 5 years. That's roughly 60 months of ovulation strips, handfuls of supplements daily, diet changes, 60 negative pregnancy tests, 6 failed rounds of IUI, countless medical tests and procedures, and injections. It's 60 months of acupuncture, chiropractic work, teas, seed cycling, and support groups. While the emotional and psychological toll cannot be alleviated by this bill, the financial one can. I need your support, along with the 1 in 6 in our state living with the disease of infertility and the thousands of Oregonians diagnosed with cancer during their reproductive years. It is time for Oregonians to receive comprehensive insurance coverage for the medical care needed to build their families. As proven in other states, insurance covering vitro fertilization (IVF) decreases the chance of multiple births, and lowering multiple births decreases overall health care costs and results in healthier babies and healthier parents.
