As a 30-year Marine, I have had the pleasure and honor of serving with men and women in combat. Chuck knew it was a privilege to wear the uniform with both unwavering integrity and a grateful heart. Chuck's service to this nation and to his state of Oregon should not go unnoticed and should be celebrated. Cuck once told me, "It wasn't about the numbers he killed in Vietnam that was important, it was the number of Marines he saved."

Chuck spent years trying to improve Oregon's natural resources through his forest service.

Chuck unselfishly spent time away from his family to promote ethics throughout the state through his teachings and courses.

Chuck was the epitome of a family man by always keeping his wife and boys a priority, no matter what was on his schedule.

Most important, Chuck turned down many monetary deals to promote himself (movie and book deals) and his Vietnam service to stay grounded to his family and Oregon home in Baker City.

This testimony is from the heart and is about honoring a man that embellishes honor, humility and sacrifice. Traits hard to find these days within our nation.
