I am writing to express my support for Oregon's Regional Family Networks and to share the impact that Families Connected/Familias en Conexión, the Regional Family Network serving Lane County, has had on my family's life.

Families Connected/Familias en Conexión is a family-led organization supporting parents in their journey of raising children with intellectual and developmental disabilities across Lane County. Families Connected and Familias en Conexión provides information, resources and culturally responsive support to families across a geographically expansive county.

In 2023-2024, Families Connected/Familias en Conexión:

- Provided support to more than 1,055 families
- Hosted 134 parent trainings and family events with 8,796 people in attendance
- Partnered with 365 community agencies

Many families raising children with intellectual and developmental disabilities, especially in rural and Latinx communities, face deep systemic barriers. Families Connected & Familias en Conexión provides:

- Culturally grounded, bilingual programs and family support
- Accessible, neurodiversity-affirming family events, such as the biannual Strength in Neurodiversity festivals
- Host Sensory Zones at community events to reduce isolation and encourage active family participation in their communities
- Provide disability awareness trainings to community partners, faith-based institutions and schools
- Help families navigate education, medical and disability service systems
- Host skill-building trainings to empower parents to advocate and plan for a positive and possible future for their children

Regional Family Networks are a lifeline for parents raising children with disabilities. The Family Networks help reduce isolation and the number of families going into crisis. The Family Networks strengthen families by giving them hope and direction.

Familias en Conexión is a great support for our family in our journey with our son's disability. It gives us support, connects us with other families who are also raising a child with a disability, and we support each other as a Latino community. We talk about how we face the challenges of raising a child with a disability, and Familias en Conexión supports us with information and resources. We feel that we have a Latino community that listens

and understands us, when we need information. We feel supported by Familias en Conexión. Each month we meet and discuss topics of interest to each of us as we face the challenges we face with our children's disability.
