My name is Jay Ylvisaker and I am a business owner and Community member from Cloverdale, OR. I am writing today to support HB 3372. Currently in Oregon it is legal to water a ½ acre garden or use 5,000 gal/day for a commercial purpose, but neither of those apply to growing food and farm products for sale. Why is it legal to use the water for personal use, or even for other businesses like dog grooming or hair salons, but selling veggies from my garden would mean I was breaking the law?

This personally impacts me because: People in my community are hungry, and we have to drive a minimum of 25 minutes to get groceries at a store. Due to the outdated law farmers market providers have been shut down and our community is suffering that loss. Many people depend on the weekly local food supply that was available at the Farmers Market, including me and my family. PLEASE I am asking t that you change the law and allow small farms to produce food for their communities.

- Being able to irrigate less than 1/2 an acre would mean we could produce enough food to feed our community, getting real organic produce to many families in this area.
- Community members are desperate for this food and access.
- There are less than HALF the vendors in the last 2 years since this law began being enforced.
- We have been severely impacted by this loss of farmers (2 farms shut down completely) and therefor this loss of food that is easily available.
- Having small farms in our area means that we have sustainable supply that is easily available. It means that Farmers Markets have the vendors to make them successful and to reach out to more and more community members. It means people can find affordable accessible food to put on their tables for their families.
- There has always been a need for small scale, on the ground food production.
 Especially now in these uncertain times. Half acre farms would provide abundant food for the local community, while providing the most efficient water usage. Please pass HB 3372.

We need to be realistic about what we prioritize for water use in our state. Allowing people to grow food or farm products for sale with a gallon restriction on ½ acre will not bankrupt the system, and farming is too much work for people to rush into production on such a small scale. Give communities back the ability to feed and provide for themselves, pass HB 3372.
