I STRONGLY OPPOSE the proposal to use Oregon's Kicker refund to fund wildfire relief and prevention efforts. The Kicker is a unique and essential part of Oregon's tax structure, designed to return surplus revenue to taxpayers. This refund is a direct investment in Oregonians, and it is vital that it remains protected for its intended purpose: providing financial relief to individuals and families who contribute to the state's economic growth.

Let's work together to find a more stable and reliable way to address wildfire risks without compromising the Kicker and the financial stability it provides for taxpayers.

If every person in this state who resides or works here contributed \$10 per year to a wildfire fund, with an approximate population of 4.27 million people would equal over \$40 million. Everyone that lives or works in this state is affected by wildfires and breathes the same air when one starts and there is absolutely no reason why \$10 couldn't be contributed to this fund to help fight fires rather than taking Oregonian Kicker funding.

I strongly suggest that Legislators begin working on solving the REAL issue which are the heavily forested lands in this state that remain heavily laden with fuel to burn, including the lands that have already burnt with trees remaining, waiting to burn again. These lands need to have reservoirs on them that hold water for fighting fires and fire breaks between them and communities/homeowners. The burden of maintaining those lands needs to be addressed, not the people who live next to them who burn regardless of what they do to their properties.

LA is a fine example of that. It's time Legislators begin listening to the people and
