My background is rooted in a passion for academia and research as well as supporting children and their families.

I have been privileged enough to have access to strong medical care my whole life as both of my parents are in the military so I had Tricare. Additionally, both of my parents love research and are surrounded by other working professionals with which they can have educated discourse regarding current health recommendations and avenues to wellness. That being said, there are so many families lacking access to proper health care, guidance from their physician after life altering news regarding their child's health, and some that do not even have access to computers or the internet as a whole to research a new diagnosis. A diagnosis that was mostly likely riddled with hard to distinguish medical jargon and little follow-through. Even if parents are able to look up "next steps", the internet is filled with so much conflicting medical information that families have no idea where to begin.

Passing HB 2741 would mean streamlined support for families and early detection.
