The Oregon Department of Agriculture's Native Plant Conservation Program relies heavily on OregonFlora. The Native Plant Conservation Program oversees the conservation and management of Oregon's listed plant species, in part because the native plants of Oregon are our natural history. Currently, OregonFlora depends on grants and donations to fund its work. State funding would ensure that OregonFlora is sustainable.

OregonFlora is an evolving state of art web-based resource. California also has a similar web-based floral program that is evolving too.

This is especially important in southern Oregon along the state line where many native plants cross the border.
