I am 72 years old. I returned to academia late in life, after other pursuits, because more than anything else in life I wanted to teach and to research. I came poor and did not expect wealth, but I came because it was and is my strongest passion. It is a way f caring for others, my community, and our world. I've taught well, and in just a decae I have published more than two dozen peer-reviewed papers and foyr books; my fifth is now under way.

The increasing impoverishment of PSU has pushed me onto Unemployment Insurance three times during thed last five years. The University cannot offer any hooe for advancement. For the last year I have been fighting for my job against the financial and other pressures PSU and my departments in particular are under. This has left me deeply stressed, as I have to scrounge to stay housed and fed, despite my age, skills, and accomplishments.

This is a said state of thing not only for me but for Oregon. The state university system is losing or wasting large amounts of talent in teaching and scholarship. This talent is not exprensive. Few scholars expect riches: they will work for modest salaries out of love for their students and their fields.

Higher education is the most productive investment this State can make for the common good. It is as close to a certainty in advancing the public well-being as anything can be.

Please generously fund our students, faculty, and infrastructure.
