

PROGRAMS INCLUDED IN SB 825

State Energy Efficient Design (SEED) Program

- The SEED program began in 1991 with the simple goal of minimizing the use of energy resources
- The program tracks
 energy usage and energy
 efficiency measures
 deployed in Oregon's
 state agencies

Building Performance Standard (BPS)

- Passed in 2023 through HB 3409
- Performance Standard (BPS) to regulate energy consumption in public and private buildings that are 20,000 square feet or greater

Oregon's Small-Scale Local Energy Loan Program (SELP)

- Oregon's energy loan program offered fixedrate, long-term loans for qualified energy efficiency projects
- ODOE does not have authority to issue more loans



MEASURE SUMMARY

Senate Bill 825 Proposes:

- 1. To eliminate parts of the State Energy Efficient Design (SEED) Program that are also required by the new Building Performance Standard (BPS) Program requirements
- 2. Remove the outdated references to previous state agency energy reduction goals
- 3. Remove reporting requirements no longer needed for the Small-Scale Local Energy Loan Program (SELP)





EFFECTS ON ODOE AND STAKEHOLDERS

- 1. There is no fiscal impact to ODOE
 - Reporting state agency building energy use is done by staff across multiple agencies and supported by staff at ODOE and the Department of Administrative Services
- 2. Since the measure reduces redundant reporting, it will increase available time and resources for ODOE and other agency staff
- 3. SELP is no longer issuing loans, so no stakeholders will be affected
