Testimony in Support of HB 3489, Reinstatement of the Timber Severance Tax

Chair Nathanson and Members of the House Committee on Revenue:

I urge you to support HB 3489: this bill will reinstate the Timber Severance Tax, that was reduced then ended in the 1990s. This has been a hardship for many timber-dependent rural communities. 40% of the tax revenue will go to the counties where timber is harvested, supporting schools to public safety. In addition, 40% of revenues will go to a newly created Wildfire Management Fund. Wildfires are increasing in severity and frequency as a result of the climate crisis. Costs for fighting wildfires has increased and we must have an ongoing source of funds for fire management.

Oregon currently collects a smaller share of logging profits than our neighboring states of Washington and California. Many of the largest timber owners live outside of the state, and utilize a tax structure of Real Estate Investment Trusts, thus paying no Oregon state income tax; this is our primary source of revenue for Oregon. Reinstituting the timber severance tax will remedy this situation.

The bill creates a progressive tax, based on the total forest acreage of the landowner (it does not need to be contiguous). A tax % times the pond value—the price paid at the mill--makes a fair tax structure. Small forestland owners pay 2% if owning 500 acre or less. Landowners of 500-2500 acres, 4%. Over 2500 acres to 5000 acres, 5%. Over 5000 acres 6%. Reductions in the percentage rate are reduced for timber harvests are certified under the Forest Stewardship Council.

I strongly urge the Revenue Committee to pass HB 3489 and move it out of committee. Reinstituting the severance tax for timber harvest in Oregon is the right thing to do.
