RE: Support for Institute for Natural Resources

Dear Co-Chairs,

Over the past several decades, I attended graduate school at OSU and remained in Oregon to establish a career as an aquatic ecologist. My professional endeavors throughout this period have been enhanced by INR's dedication to excellence in its legislatively mandated mission to "deliver management-relevant information that informs discussions and decisions about the long-term stewardship of Oregon's natural resources, and works to advance centralized, science-based natural resource information for Oregon and the Pacific Northwest."

In fulfilling this mission, INR maintains a highly diverse portfolio of projects. I have directly experienced many of these as a student, consultant, federal research scientist, and adjunct university faculty member. These differing roles have enabled me to use INR databases and technical products, collaborate with INR staff, and be the beneficiary of outstanding INR science support. To illustrate, I offer just a few of many possible examples.

- Databases and technical products: During development of the Oregon Private Forest Accord in 2020, representatives, including myself, from the conservation and working forest coalitions relied on the vertebrate animal ranks maintained by the Oregon Biodiversity Information Center (ORBIC) to help identify which fish and amphibian species to propose for coverage in the associated Habitat Conservation Plan. To complete that and many other projects, the Oregon Explorer offered me efficiency as a one-stop data shop, compiling and serving numerous high-quality geodatabases. I have also repeatedly turned to and cited INR technical publications as authoritative source material, notable among these is "Trees to Tap: Forest Management and Community Drinking Water" (2021).
- Collaboration: In 2008, the INR initiated and facilitated a project to evaluate the potential for systematic reviews of published research findings to inform best practices in natural resources management. Prior to this, such reviews were common in clinical medicine but novel in other fields. An INR staff member recruited me and another scientist to review the research publications. The three of us developed the review strategy and wrote the final report, "A Pilot Test of Systematic Review Techniques: Evaluating Whether Wood Placements in Streams of the Pacific Northwest Affect Salmonid Abundance, Growth, Survival or Habitat Complexity." This report demonstrated the utility of the approach and led the Oregon

Department of Forestry to undertake other systematic reviews, most recently in 2024 regarding the effects of post-disturbance timber harvest on streams.

• Science support: I serve as a co-chair of the Independent Research and Science Team (IRST), which was established by the Oregon legislature to assist the Board of Forestry in adaptive management decisions. Based on its longevity and stellar reputation, the INR was chosen as the housing agency for the IRST. Since 2023, Dr. Lisa Gaines as INR Director and Dr. Sean Gordon as Forest Landscapes Lead have supplied outstanding facilitation and science support to the IRST. Under their leadership, IRST meetings have run smoothly, achieved objectives, and complied with the Oregon Public Meetings Law. In addition, they have assisted the IRST in hitting milestones on time, including developing our charter, and have been instrumental in collaborating with IRST members to plan, develop, and draft work products.

I do hope these examples help convey INR's invaluable contributions to understanding and managing Oregon's natural resources. Although I realize that some of INR's funding comes from other state and federal sources, the latter is highly uncertain at this moment. Thus, I strongly encourage you to advocate for and fully fund INR, ensuring that their important work on behalf of our state and region continues into the future.
