Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen,

Thank you for having me today.

My name is **Dale Moffett**, and I'm here as a **concerned citizen**, **veteran**, a **student**, and someone who was **formerly incarcerated**.

I know my time is limited, so I'll get right to it.

In **2005**, I was incarcerated and sent to prison out in **Pendleton**, **Oregon**. When I got there, I arrived carrying a lot of **toxic masculinity** — thinking I needed to be a tough guy to survive.

That mindset led to fights, and one of them landed me in **segregation** — **180 days in the hole**. While I was in there, I got a letter from my daughter. She told me she was done talking to me because I couldn't even stay out of jail **while I was in jail**.

That letter broke something in me.

But it also woke something up.

I knew I needed a different path — a **positive** path.

So I started taking courses through **Blue Mountain Community College** while incarcerated.

Later, after returning to the Willamette Valley and working for the Secretary of State, I got involved with **College Inside**, a program run through **Chemeketa Community College**. I was able to earn **two associate degrees** — and I served as a **tutor**, helping other men get their **GEDs** and **associate degrees** too.

That program changed the course of my life.

Today, I'm proud to be enrolled in **Oregon's first-ever bachelor's program at a community college**, right at **Chemeketa**.

I'm finally finishing a dream I promised my mom years ago — and more importantly, I've become someone my **children and grandchildren can be proud of again**.

And this isn't just a personal story — it's proof that **education works**.

Studies show that education improves a person's chance of being successful after incarceration. While Oregon's overall **recidivism rate** is about **21%**, the rate for men in **College Inside** is **less than 10%**.

That's not just a number — that's **transformation**. That's **prevention**, and **hope**, and **real change**.

Chemeketa gave me a second chance.

They opened their doors, supported me, and treated me like family.

There are thousands more people like me — ready for that same opportunity. That's why I'm asking you today:

Please vote YES on SB 5525 to support the \$920 million to fund our community colleges.

For second chances. For education. For people like me. For a future we all deserve.
