Dear Committee Members:

The Domestic Violence Clinic (Clinic) at the University of Oregon School of Law provides free legal services to low-income community survivors, including student survivors, of domestic and sexual violence and stalking. Many of these survivors have nowhere else to turn for help navigating the complexities of protective orders, family law, benefits, housing, and employment. The Clinic's work reaches communities across Lane County, including rural and underserved regions where legal aid options are limited or nonexistent.

This important work is only possible because of funding from HECC. With HECC's support, the Clinic has been able to train law students through direct, supervised client work, giving students the legal knowledge and practical skills to effectively serve clients. The law students who participate in the Clinic learn not just the relevant law and procedure, but also how to work with survivors of abuse in a trauma-informed way. Many clinic alumni report that their work in the Clinic was one of their most valuable law school experiences.

The continuity of HECC funding allows the law school to serve survivors in Oregon and teach law students to do the same. This dual benefit makes the Clinic a high-impact, cost-effective program.
