Testimony in Support of Oregon Senate Bill 1181

Moreover, the amendments to ORS 743.683 to prevent the duplication of benefits and set standards for policy provisions are commendable. These changes ensure that Medicare supplement policies are designed to complement, not duplicate, existing Medicare benefits, thereby maximizing the value of coverage for policyholders.

By removing discriminatory practices based on health status and geographic location, senate bill 1181 promotes a more inclusive and just healthcare system. It reflects a commitment to protecting vulnerable populations and ensuring that all individuals, regardless of their health condition, have access to the coverage they need.

In conclusion, the ALS Association strongly supports Senate Bill 1181 and urges its swift passage. This legislation is a crucial step toward ensuring that individuals with ALS and other pre-existing conditions have access to the comprehensive healthcare coverage they deserve.
