Dear Ms. Hildick:

For 21 years, I represented Clatsop County in the Oregon Legislature. From 2000 to 2021 I had a "front row seat" to the dynamic renaissance of downtown Astoria. The recovery and restoration of the Liberty Theatre was the first step. As the theatre was "dressed up", people felt good about coming back downtown. Specialty stores, first-class boutique hotels, and high-end restaurants followed. People invested in their place and cheered for it to blossom. Success gave way to more success. Word spread throughout Oregon that Astoria was "cool" and had lots of amenities to share.

Notable among those venues and organizations that "rolled out the red carper" for visitors - not just Oregonians but global guests-was the Columbia River Maritime Museum. They remain the #1 tourist attraction in Astoria, surpassing even the Goonies House and the fabled Astoria Column.

The Maritime Museum has been at the center of "cultural gravitational pull" in the region. The newly opened display "Cedar and Sea Gallery" will compliment the late fall opening of another Native American exhibit focused on the foundational role that indigenous people played in our region. Memorialized in the Lewis and Clark diaries that were produced during the 1805 Corps of Discovery indigenous contributions to the maritime culture of NW Oregon are proudly displayed and interpreted - always with participation of the Tribes.

Columbia River Maritime Museum's programming is designed to be experiential and interpretive. Visitors are immersed in the powerful ocean forces that characterize the Columbia River Bar. Visitors can walk beside the Coast Guard vessels and helicopters that protect commercial and recreational mariners. Virtually all the exhibits possess some element of "interactivity" in addition to weaving the tapestry of historic manuscripts, maps and artifacts into the "visitor experience". A 3D theatre puts guests in the "middle of the action" across an ever changing tableau of offerings.

The new Mariners Hall project was recommended by the Cultural Resource Economic Fund (CREF) Review Panel to move into "Phase II" review. Part of their process includes the solicitation of letters supporting Mariners Hall for funding.

As a long-time board member, personal contributor and legislative advocate for the "economic drivers" of Clatsop County, I was delighted to be asked. Please consider this correspondence as my unqualified support for the Columbia River Maritime Museum project.

A few quick "factoids" may aid in your deliberations.

- The museum has no debt and robust reserves

- The board is active, engaged, generous, probative and, occasionally, constructively critical of staff recommendations and activity.
- -The board has paid earnest attention to financial stability, administrative and staff continuity as well as board solicitation and development.
- Children are a huge part of museum programming. Designed to augment educational experiences for rural students, immersive educational opportunities are designed to capture the imagination of all academic levels. The environment is a perfect introduction to a vast array of career and professional opportunities.
- There is ample parking, attractive and well-kept grounds, stylish advertising in appropriate publications, membership communications and active "word of mouth" visitor solicitations.
- The Columbia River Maritime Museum has <u>The Best</u> retail space that contributes to the "bottom line" with earned revenue generated from an eclectic mix of high quality and attractively priced complimentary merchandise.
- Continuous investment in the physical plant improves the quality of experience, not just for visitors, but also for the professional staff seeking career advancement in the museum and cultural sector.

I will close by calling attention to one of my favorite programs at the Columbia River Maritime Museum with a global educational emphasis. Small boats, equipped with GPS monitoring, are released in cooperation with military and community maritime operations. These small boats, designed by kids in rural and less prosperous communities, are tracked as they make their way across the Pacific Ocean. Who knows how many metrologists, marine pilots, coast guard officers and seamen, oceanographers, marine scientists-the list goes on and on - are motivated by these tiny maritime travelers? I've been to schools and personally viewed the unalloyed joy and wonderment in the eyes of the youthful participants.

No monetary price can be attributed to the possibilities born out of the rich curriculum offered by CRMM. However, you can start with a financial investment in the Mariners Hall through CREF funding to keep the maritime light alive. This is a hell of an opportunity. I hope the CREF and the Legislature seize it.
