My name is Judy Newman and I am testifying on behalf of the Eugene 4J School Board in favor of HB 3365 A Engrossed which expands and embeds Climate Change Education in our K-12 schools.

Our School Board sets Legislative Priorities every other year and this year we identified the need to increase evidence based curriculum and instruction on climate change in our schools. And to expand our efforts to implement practices that reduce our school district's carbon footprint.

We have heard many times from our 4J students their strong desire and urgency for more comprehensive and robust climate education in their studies and our School Board wants to honor their consistent and compelling advocacy.
