We are writing to encourage and request commitment for **continued investment in the communities that have historically been excluded from public infrastructure and economic development efforts**. This is why we strongly support the request for \$50 million in state bonding for the T.V. Highway Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) **Project**.

Everyday, we witness the consequences of the chronic underinvestment along this corridor: inaccessible and unsafe transportation infrastructure for pedestrians, cyclists and drivers, limited access to affordable housing, gaps in public services, and much more. The TV Highway Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Project, co-led by TriMet and Metro, represents an important step toward correcting these long-standing inequities we live with everyday.

The proposed investments, including enhanced pedestrian crossings, safer intersections, covered bus shelters, improved lighting, and real-time arrival information, will dramatically improve safety and mobility for residents who rely on public transit. The transit project will also introduce an express bus service with 12-minute intervals, connecting people to jobs, education, and essential services more reliably than ever before. This is not just a transit project, it is a lifeline for our community members that rely on TV Highway every day. But to realize the full potential of this investment, we urge you to ensure that a meaningful portion of the lottery bond proceeds are directed toward multimodal transportation, affordable housing, support for small businesses, and community-serving infrastructure along the corridor.

These investments are not just necessary, but long overdue. They will enhance safety, economic opportunity, and long-term community health. Most importantly, we call for continued community involvement in decision-making processes to ensure that residents' voices and lived experiences guide how investments are implemented in the Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) project.
