I support SB 547A, which would designate April as Oregon's Native Plant Appreciation month.

Oregon has over 3400 native plant species, including 120 species that are found only in Oregon. Native plants are important to Oregon for several reasons:

- 1. **Biodiversity**: By preserving native plants, we help protect the diversity of Oregon's natural habitats. Native plants support native insects, birds, and other animals, building a strong foundation for healthy ecosystems.

- 6. **Economy:** Native trees, especially the Douglas fir, Western redcedar, and Western hemlock, are the backbone of the timber and construction industries.
