It would also raise awareness among the broader public about a beautiful, peaceful tradition that deserves to be known and appreciated. Most of all, it could bring our community closer together. So many of us are looking for that connection.

Beyond cultural recognition, celebrating Nowruz publicly can have social and economic benefits. It encourages cultural tourism, community events, and small business participation. Just as Lunar New Year and Diwali have gained visibility and enriched their communities, so too can Nowruz in Oregon.

Most importantly, this bill represents inclusion. It tells Iranian Americans and others who celebrate Nowruz that our stories matter and that Oregon sees us.

Please vote yes on HB 3768 and help make Oregon a place where cultural diversity is honored, and all of us have the chance to feel a little less alone.
