Homelessness continues to rise, even as services also increase



<u>WHY?</u>

A Decade of Disinvestment in Kids

2011 - - Local "Children & Families Commissions" Eliminated

2009 - 15 - - Budget Cuts to:

Homeless Youth MH / BH Programs Foster Care Child Welfare

<u>By 2019:</u>

- ✓ 67% <u>cut</u> in children's residential programs,
- ✓ 90% <u>cut</u> to homeless youth programs,
- ✓ 90%+ <u>cut</u> to substance abuse treatment for children.

Result:

- ✓ Oregon is now 46th in youth mental health
- 21,000+ homeless <u>adults</u> (who came from...)

We cannot end youth homelessness until we prevent it. That's why Chapin Hall has launched a four-phase initiative to continue momentum and action to

Math:

400+ youth aging out of services each year

9 years X 400 = 3,600

42.5% of Homeless Adults are 25-44

Total Homeless Ages 25-44* = 3,549

* Oregon Point In Time Count, 2023

MPROVEMENT





Legislative Action:

2021 - - \$2.0 million

2022 - - \$4.5 million

2023 - - <mark>\$25.1</mark> million (DHS + Housing)

2025 - - Governor = \$20.4 GRB

Independent 2023 Study (From This Committee):

Recommended: \$154 million / biennium

BUDGET REQUESTS: ODHS YOUTH EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS PROGRAM

GRB POP 502, \$19.7m: Maintains housing and other supports in 26 counties

Budget Request, \$10m: Expands YEHP funding to reach underserved communities

HB 3970: CREATING A MORE COMPREHENSIVE CONTINUUM OF CARE

STRENGTHEN THE YEH WORKFORCE

Meets YEH workforce needs by hiring and training adults with lived experience who are best able to relate to and support other youth

SUBSTANCE ABUSE AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SUPPORT

- Provides access to behavioral and mental health services
- Provides access to substance use disorder support

EXPAND EXISTING OHCS FAMILY HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION

- Expands funding for the OHCS YEHA Program from \$5m to \$7.5m
- Prevents houseless through emergency rent assistance, security deposit assistance, application fees and other services
- Expands YEHA eligibility so that families with children under the age of 5 can benefit from assistance

What Do We Know?



2/3 of youth who are homeless for <u>as</u> <u>little as</u> **3 months** go on to become homeless as adults.



What Actually Works?

YEHP!

- ✓ 85% Success Rate
- ✓ 94% Graduation Rate

Bottom Line:



We cannot fix or end <u>ADULT</u>

homelessness until we fix YOUTH homelessness



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
