While it's framed as a transportation improvement plan, the reality is it imposes steep tax and fee increases that will fall hardest on working families and rural residents. From raising the gas tax by over 60% to adding per-mile charges for electric vehicles and new car transfer taxes, this bill asks too much of everyday Oregonians at a time when many are already struggling to afford basic needs. And yet, most of the money goes toward massive highway projects—not toward safer streets, school routes, or public transit improvements that would actually serve communities.

Even more troubling is how little transparency this bill offers. It puts too much of the burden on those with the least and gives too much power to those at the top. Oregon deserves better.
