My name is John Joost, and I'm a lifelong Oregon resident. I'm writing to share how devastating an extra gas tax would be for my family and many others who are already struggling just to survive in this economy.

Every week, I watch more of my paycheck disappear just to keep my car running—so I can get to work, take my kids to school, and buy groceries. We don't have the luxury of skipping trips or working from home. For us, every mile matters. When gas goes up even a few cents, that's money we have to take from somewhere else—like food, rent, or medical bills.
