Instead of new taxes, we should prioritize efficient use of existing transportation funds, cut wasteful spending, and explore innovative solutions like public-private partnerships. Other states have improved infrastructure without overburdening taxpayers, and Oregon can do the same with thoughtful, fiscally responsible policies.

I urge you to listen to the growing chorus of Oregonians saying "no" to HB 2025. This bill's massive tax increases, lack of transparency, and disregard for working families make it the wrong choice for our state. Please vote no and work toward solutions that strengthen Oregon without breaking our budgets.
