Portland does not need more police surveillance. We need more accountability, more community support systems, and more investment in real safety—not state-sanctioned intimidation. The people of Portland have made it clear that we want care, not control. We want safety rooted in community, not intimidation from above. We do not want our taxpayer dollars funding tools that will only deepen the divide between the people and those in power.

Please vote no on the expansion of police surveillance drones. Portland deserves better.
