Measure Description

The measure grants the Oregon Board of Pharmacy (OBOP) the authority to issue licenses to mobile pharmacy operators. The measure specifies eligibility requirements for licensure, as well as minimum standards and prohibitions for mobile operators. The measure permits OBOP to take any action needed to be able to issue licenses by the operative date.

Fiscal Analysis

The fiscal impact for OBOP is estimated to be \$98,990 Other Funds in the 2025-27 biennium and \$181,754 Other Funds in the 2027-29 biennium, related to the costs of a position that OBOP will hire to support implementation of the measure.

Oregon Board of Pharmacy

To develop and support issuance of this new license type, OBOP would hire one permanent, full-time Administrative Specialist 1 position (0.50 FTE in the 2025-27 biennium and 1.00 FTE in the 2027-29 biennium) to assist with rulemaking, legal reviews, and communication to stakeholders. The cost for this position, including personal services and standard position-related services and supplies costs, is \$98,990 Other Funds in the 2025-27 biennium and \$181,754 Other Funds in the 2027-29 biennium. OBOP estimates there are currently 162 retail pharmacies in Oregon that are eligible for this new license.

OBOP is entirely funded with Other Funds, and the agency's primary source of funding is license and registration fees from pharmacists and drug outlets. Any new fees adopted by OBOP by rule, as allowed under this measure, would be subject to the legislative fee approval process outlined in ORS 291.050 and ORS 291.055.

Other entities

The measure has no fiscal impact on counties or the Oregon Health Authority.

Relevant Dates

The measure takes effect on the 91st day after sine die.

The measure becomes operative January 1, 2027.
