**WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:**

The measure creates new requirements and prohibitions for the potency and packaging of cannabinoid products. The measure takes effect on the 91st day following adjournment sine die.

Detailed Summary:

Requires that each cannabinoid edible in a package of cannabinoid edibles be individually wrapped. Permits up to 10 milligrams of adult-use cannabinoid per individual cannabinoid edible. Applies to marijuana items sold on or after January 1, 2027.

**ISSUES DISCUSSED:**

**EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:**

The amendment replaces the measure.

**BACKGROUND:**

In 2014, Oregonians voted to pass [Ballot Measure 91](#), legalizing the possession and use of marijuana by adults. The Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission (OLCC) oversees access to cannabis products in the state. OLCC regulates recreational cannabis retailer and lab licensing, packaging, and labeling of marijuana and hemp products in the OLCC-licensed marijuana marketplace. [Oregon Revised Statutes Chapter 475C](#) regulates cannabis products, including the labeling, potency testing, zoning limitations for licensees, and packaging requirements. Senate Bill 1548 A creates new requirements and prohibitions for the potency and packaging of cannabinoid products sold after January 1, 2027.
