WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

The measure expands the definition of “police officer” for purposes of the Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) to include assistant attorneys general; juvenile custody services specialists and juvenile court counselors of a county juveniles department who perform specified duties; forensic scientists or evidence technicians employed by a county sheriff, municipal police department, or a university police department; people responsible for obtaining, classifying, and verifying fingerprints who are employed by the Department of State Police, a county sheriff, a municipal police department, or a university police department; certified medicolegal death investigators employed by a county sheriff, municipal police department, county health department, or a university police department; and force protection officers and leaders employed by the Oregon Military Department who perform specified duties. The measure applies to individuals employed in these positions for work performed on or after the measure’s effective date.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Past legislation related to hazardous positions and police officers within PERS
- Definition of “public safety employee” in and potential conflict with the Internal Revenue Code
- Potential fiscal impact of the measure
- Work performed by job classifications covered in the measure

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

No amendment.

BACKGROUND:

PERS provides retirement benefits for approximately 900 state agencies and units of local government, including public schools, community colleges, cities, and counties. PERS is overseen by a five-member board that appoints an executive director to manage the agency’s daily operations, including managing benefits for more than 390,000 active, inactive, and retired members and beneficiaries. PERS members are in one of three plans, depending on when they first became a member: Tier One, Tier Two, and the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan (OPSRP). PERS members who work in positions that meet the definitions for “police officer” and “firefighter” are eligible for special benefit provisions, such as retiring at an earlier age and calculating their retirement benefit with a higher statutory factor.

In 2024, House Bill 4045, in part, added forensic scientists and evidence technicians employed by the Department of State Police, and district attorneys to the definition of “police officer” for purposes of PERS.
