Co-Chair Helm, Co-Chair Owens, Vice-Chair McDonald, and members of the committee,

My name is Matt Van Wey and I am a farm owner and employer in Clackamas County.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on HB 4153. I urge you to vote no on this bill.

As a first generation farmer, I am acutely aware of the barriers for young and beginning farmers to access affordable farm land that hasn't been inherited or passed down for generations. This bill would allow further development of EFU land, increasing the cost of entry and preventing future generations of farmers from accessing affordable farm land. The issue is not a lack of venues to sell farm products, these already exist in farmers markets, commercial districts in town, and small farm stands that are already permitted on working farmland. We need viable, working farms on the periphery of thriving, commercial town and city centers, where the majority of products should be sold.

Without stronger requirements tying nonfarm commercial activity directly to ongoing agricultural production, HB 4153 opens the door to de facto rural commercial development under the guise of "farm stores."

HB 4153 creates a powerful incentive to site retail stores and restaurant-like uses on agricultural land zoned for exclusive farm use because it is cheaper, taxed at farm-use value, and located outside city commercial regulations. This undermines local farmers who actually want to farm, as development makes land unaffordable for new and beginning farmers. It also threatens the vitality of nearby towns and small cities, which rely on their commercial districts for jobs and tax base.

For decades, Oregon has made deliberate policy choices to concentrate commercial

development inside urban growth boundaries while protecting agricultural land for agricultural use. I support farmer-owned and operated stores, restaurants, and event venues inside our cities and small towns. I support direct sales for farmers under existing farm stand provisions that require farming to remain the predominant use.

HB 4153 moves the state in the opposite direction and risks incremental but permanent erosion of EFU protections. By voting no on this bill, you will be protecting the critical land base on which Oregon's \$42 billion agricultural industry depends.
