As others have noted, for which I will echo and amplify, my reaction to the behavior of leadership on the issue of campaign finance reform is now beyond contempt. As someone, along with dozens of others in the so-called "good government" groups in Oregon, who has worked to help bring meaningful and ENFORCEABLE campaign regulations to our fair state for two decades now, I shouldn't be surprised at this latest trick play by those of you in Salem.

It's now obvious that you will implement real campaign finance reform over any number of dead bodies.

I'm co-chair of the Independent Party of Oregon, with the state's largest registered party membership after the Ds and Rs. We are now 140,000+ members strong. And the number one issue for our membership? Guess what. It's campaign finance reform. Protecting the original intent and keeping the "teeth" in the original HB 4018 is supported by a whopping 90% of our members surveyed.
