Measure, Appointment or Topic: SB1516

I oppose SB1516 as written and will only support SB1516 with the -A15 language added in. Codifying the definition of end-to-end encryption strengthens Oregon's ability to hold third party vendors accountable when they break the law. These corporations must be forced to uphold to a higher standard especially with matters concerning our citizens data. If adding a definition to end-to-end encryption to this bill requires companies to refactor and update their architecture, that is a good thing. I urge you to either strengthen the language of SB1516, or do not support SB1516.

1. Oregon should join states like Maine and Virginia by retaining ALPR data for an absolute maximum of 21 days.
2. Oregon must require ALPR vendors to use end-to-end encryption and must also define end-to-end encryption in law.
3. Oregon must define in law when it is appropriate to use ALPR cameras, focusing on felonies and the most serious offenses.

I hope the right course of action is taken regarding this matter.
