Measure, Appointment or Topic: SB1601

Dear Chair Girod, Chair Nosse, and members of the committee,

On behalf of the Sisters Trails Alliance, a non-profit volunteer organization working under a service agreement with the Deschutes National Forest to maintain 200 miles of public trails and community connectors, including the new Sisters Schools Nature Trail, I am writing to ask you not to redirect funding from the Oregon Community Paths and Safe Routes to School programs to highway maintenance and operations as currently laid out in the -3 amendment to SB 1601.

We support redirecting funds to operations and maintenance of the current transportation system, but not at the expense of the safety of our most vulnerable community members, our schoolchildren and others who cannot drive. We suggest major highway project funding be redirected to meet the current highway operations and maintenance needs instead.

More than 80% of Oregonians report using local trails, that is a higher percentage of Oregonians than those that drive. Off-street paths provide the absolute safest places in our community for people of all ages and abilities to walk and bike. The Oregon Community Paths and Safe Routes to School program are already tragically underfunded, and people continue to die on our streets as a result.

Please preserve the following funds from any budget cuts:

- Multimodal Active Transportation Fund: funded in part by the bike tax and currently directed entirely to Oregon Community Paths program to fund safe, off-street alternatives.
- Transportation Operating Funds: non-street funding that funds passenger rail, paths, and para-transit
- Safe Routes to School Funds
